
True mission partnership is about building relationships, learning from one another and walking together in faith and friendship. Together we can build the body of Christ around the world.

This year we will acknowledge World Communion Sunday with a "Parade of Breads" from cultures and countries near and far, presented by our youth and supplied by our Deacons.

The mix of breads will also be offered in the communion service in place of our usual white bread. The breads will then be carried to coffee hour as part of an **Agape Feast** which is a fellowship meal recalling the meals Jesus shared with disciples during his ministry and expressing the koinonia (Greek for community, sharing, fellowship). A variety of spreads will complement the breads along with hot and cold beverages and delicious cookies. A great celebration for all!



Oct 1st is also the culmination of **Peacemaking**. This fall we have been focusing on the PC(USA)Peace and Global Witness Special Offering. 25% of all the monies collected will remain with our local congregation to be gifted to an organization we feel is meaningful great work in Peacemaking. This year's recipient is AFSP, (Association for Suicide Prevention). Another 25% will be sent on to the Presbytery to add to the Mission initiatives of the Presbytery of the Northeast. A Lesson from the Mangrove

Blessed are those who trust in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought, it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit. Jeremiah 17:7-8 NRSV

If you ever have the chance to visit the island of Puerto Rico, you might be lucky enough to experience the beauty of "manglares" (mangrove in English,) a unique ecosystem of trees that have the capacity to live in the estuaries of rivers. Puerto Rico's native red mangrove is particularly resilient and can thrive in the mix of fresh and salt water of the delta. In some real ways, a "manglar" is a single organism where individual trees support each other, share a common root system, and give shelter and food to a great variety of birds, reptiles, amphibians, and small mammals.

What a great lesson for us. The manglar is firmly planted by (actually, **in** the) water and even when in drought conditions it continues to thrive and provide. Compare that with the Cují, a solitary, sad tree that grows in the sandy wilderness of the northwest side of Venezuela, where I lived for a while. Its only noticeable quality is its ability to bend with the wind and not break, but it bears no fruit, provide scant shelter and shade, and serves little ecological purpose, other than extracting from the sand what little water available.

Why is Jeremiah using this rather obvious metaphor? Who is he speaking to? Jeremiah is preaching to a group of Israelites who have been taken captive to Babylon. The temple in Jerusalem has been destroyed and the ruling class has been exiled. If you read a few chapters before this passage, you will hear Jeremiah's admonitions to the people of Israel (especially those in a position of power) to change their ways. The admonition went unheard, the rulers' "reliance on mortals" has led them to enslavement. The people of Israel in exile are not going home any time soon, so they must learn to live together in better ways and extend their roots.

This is where Jeremiah tells the tired, struggling people of Israel that there is hope, as long as they trust in God. This is a message that is as relevant to our tired, and struggling people of today as it was back then. Let us learn to live together in better ways and extend our roots.

As we enter the month of October with our emphasis on Outreach and Mission, let us be "planted by water." Let's live like the mangrove, connected with one another in community, sharing the roots of our faith, been nourished by the Word of God, nourishing those who seek shelter and food in our midst and beyond. We can't do this by ourselves but together we can.

Prayer: We want to trust in You, O God, but sometimes it's easier to rely on mortals. Lead us into the living waters of Your presence so that we can extend our roots and bear fruit, giving life and shelter to all who need it. Make us one with one another, so that we can be one with you. Amen.

A MOMENT FOR HISTORY

The third full weekend of each October, Union County Cultural and Heritage Committee promotes a free weekend for visitors to tour the nearly 30 historical locations in the county. In Springfield, we have the Cannon Ball House on Morris Avenue. Prior to the pandemic, the County had asked if the First Presbyterian Church would consider opening her doors that weekend, to build momentum for America's 250th Anniversary in 2026. We said, "YES!"

When the Springfield Historical Society docents tell the story of the Battle of Springfield on June 23, 1780, the story always includes Rev. Caldwell scooping up the Isaac Watts hymnals from this church and handing them to the soldiers to use the pages for wadding in their muskets, and the familiar rally call of, "Give 'em Watts, Boys!". Unfortunately, the pandemic closed our doors, and when we re-opened, many of the members who were well-versed with the church history were no longer with us.

If you have an interest in learning the colonial history of this church and of the iconic church that was rebuilt from the ashes in 1791 so that this Congregation may worship here each week, please call Linda Jurczak in the office.
